

# Guide to Authorised Interruptions of Study



## AIS explained

- An interruption of study involves taking a complete break from study for an agreed period of time
- All students can take an AIS
- This is different to a 'Leave of Absence', mainly used by PGR students
- Still classed as 'students' while on AIS

Common reasons for students considering an AIS might include:

- Health reasons (mental or physical health problems)
- Maternity/Paternity/Adoption/Family Leave
- Extra-curricular opportunities e.g. elite sport, art/music related opportunities
- Employment opportunities/internships
- Financial circumstances
- Military Service





# AIS explained

- While interrupted, students do not attend classes or complete assessments, but are still regarded as a student of the University
- They can still access campus facilities and student support services including:
  - Advice from School/Deanery regarding return to study
  - The Students' Association (including the Advice Place)
  - Chaplaincy
  - Student Counselling Service
  - Disability & Learning Support Service
- During an interruption students are still subject to University policies, rules and regulations, including the Code of Student Conduct

- Students should be aware that courses and programmes may change while on AIS, which may mean, for example, returning to a different set of course options from those available before the AIS
- Students must be aware of visa regulations before confirming an interruption







### **Authorised Interruptions of Study**

#### Checklist

Please make sure you and the student have considered all of the following:

- Dates of interruption: important as students can get a refund on fees depending on certain dates. Check with Student Financial Support for dates.
- · Return to study plan completed
- · Accommodation options and rent release
- · Funding, funding bodies, loans and fees cover
- The total interruption time does not exceed the maximum allowable
- · Visa regulations are discussed with the student and SIS only should advise on visas
- Student is aware no study should be completed during AIS

#### **AIS process**

Discussion with student results in AIS request

Student & SA complete form for local approval

SA checks all above have been considered SA completes AIS request on EUCLID Once complete, confirm with student by emaiil

SA should agree with student on a contact date before return to study
